

- Develop systematic approaches with a variety of stakeholders including partner agencies, providers and internal divisions.



### HEALTHCARE

Missouri's Medicaid program is called MO HealthNet. MO HealthNet Covers qualified medical costs for individuals who meet certain eligibility requirements.

- Persons with Disabilities- who are permanently and totally disabled.
- Blind and visually impaired- Must be 18 years or older.
- Seniors- 65 years or older
- **Pregnant Women and Newborns-** Pregnant women or a child to a woman covered by MO HealthNet.
- Uninsured Women- Uninsured women ages 18-55.
- Kids- Children under the age of 19.
- Families- Children under the age of 19 and their parents/guardians.
- Medicaid Expansion- Expands Medicaid coverage to certain adults aged 19-64 who may not have qualified for Medicaid previously.

### Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

Help for families experiencing difficulty affording food. Requires an interview, verification of ID, and verification of a month's worth of income

### Eligibility Criteria:

- Gross income is less than 130% of the income limit;
- Live in Missouri
- Have a social security number for all household members receiving benefits
- Do not own more than \$2,750 in resources (Not including home, vehicles, personal property, and savings)
- Certain drug felonies will exclude you from the program

## **CHILD CARE**

DSS may be able to help with the cost of child care.

- Who is eligible?
  - If you are the parent or guardian of a child under age 13 and are:
    - Low income (150% of Federal Poverty Level)
    - Employed, Participating in job training or placement program, or searching for work
    - Attending school
    - Disabled
    - Homeless
    - Receiving services from the Children's Division
    - Benefits may come as a sliding scale, is based on your schedule, and will pay towards approved child care provider services

### **Temporary Assistance**

Temporary Assistance is a cash grant for families with zero to extremely low income.

- Who is eligible?
  - There must be a child under the age of 18 in the household
    - Or if child is 19 they must be enrolled in High School
  - Resource limits of \$1000
  - Have a SSN or apply for one
  - Be a resident of Missouri / Citizen of the US or a qualified alien
  - If a single parent household the custodial parent must cooperate with Child Support Enforcement
  - Limited to 45 month lifetime limit


### The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)

TEFAP is a Food Distribution Program which helps people in need get donated foods from their local food pantry.

Helps supplement the diets of low-income Missourians– especially the elderly – through free emergency food through six Missouri Food Banks.

• You may be eligible for help if you already get public assistance or if your income is less than 185% of the income limit.

# HOME UTILITIES

### Heating and Cooling-

- Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)
  - May be able to help pay home energy bills through
    - Energy Assistance- a one time payment for heating or cooling costs.
    - Energy Crisis Intervention Program (ECIP)-Helps pay energy bill if there are circumstances that threatens stability if energy aid is not supplied.

- Who is eligible-
  - Responsible for paying the utilities of the home (even if they rent)
  - Are a Missouri Resident and a US citizen
  - Have \$3,000 or less in bank accts, retirement accts, or investments
  - Meet income guidelines
  - Call a contracted agency in your area



## **ALTERNATIVES to ABORTION**

The Alternatives to Abortion Program can assist with services and counseling to pregnant women, at or below 185% of the federal poverty level (FPL), to assist in carrying their unborn child to term rather than terminating the pregnancy and to assist women in caring for their child or placing their child up for adoption.

The goals of the Alternatives to Abortion Program are to:

- 1) Reduce abortions and improve pregnancy outcomes by helping women practice healthy behaviors; including discontinuing the use of tobacco, alcohol, and illegal drugs, and improving their nutrition;
- 2) Improve child health and development by helping parents provide more responsible and competent care for their child(ren); and
- 3) Improve families' economic self-sufficiency by helping parents develop a vision for their own future, continue their education, and find a job.

# **CSBG (Community Services Block Grant)**

Missouri has 19 Community Action Agencies who work to empower and assist low-income families through programs that will address the major needs of the community.

- The Agencies provide services to their designated service counties. All Missouri counties are covered by at least one Agency.




## **COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS**



- Operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week

# FAMILY SAFETY PROGRAMS

### Victims of Crime Program

- Provide state and federal funding to 140 agencies statewide for services to victims, survivors and their families
- Services provided by VOCA and DVSS providers are at no cost to the victim
- Services include but not limited to: relocation, counseling, shelter, advocacy, crisis intervention, case management, prevention services, community education/awareness, translation/interpretation, court accompaniment, referral to other services etc.


